"When I was six, I told everyone I'd be Australia's first Indigenous Prime Minister. It's a big dream, but with the Back on Track team by my side, it's one I believe will become a reality.

Balancing Year 11 and 12 is already tough, but my schedule has been full-on. Between studying for WACE, completing a TAFE course, captaining my school's Justice, Peace and Advocacy Group, participating in Youth Parliament, serving on two national government reference councils, and being a board member for the Empowered Young Leaders, things got busy. On top of all that, I had to juggle flights, permission slips, catching up on missed schoolwork, and making meaningful contributions to every group I'm part of. I realised I needed support to make it all work, and that's where Back on Track stepped in.

In Year 11, my advocate, Caroline, worked with me to figure out a plan. She helped me organise my priorities, set a study schedule, and keep on top of everything with weekly checkins. She also worked with my teachers and TAFE lecturers to make sure I could keep up while I was travelling to meetings in Sydney, Canberra, and Adelaide. Thanks to her guidance, I've been able to meet my commitments at school, at TAFE, and in the wider community.

In September 2024, I joined the Back on Track team on their trip to the Kimberley. It was an amazing experience to show them around my home region and introduce them to some of the local community groups I work with. Those connections have made a real difference, and now, at least three more families are part of the program, getting the same support I've had. It feels good knowing that something I'm part of is helping other kids in my community.

I'm thinking about university next, and it's a huge relief knowing Caroline will still be there to support me. With her help, I know I can keep aiming high and pushing towards my goals."

This year marked a significant expansion for the Back on Track Foundation as we extended our reach to the Kimberley region, fulfilling our commitment to support all children affected by cancer, regardless of their location.

Our team, including the Program Director, Program Manager, and Senior Educator, travelled to Broome and Kununurra, accompanied by one of our students. Tremane Edward-Baxter. Tremane played an instrumental role in connecting us with Indigenous community groups. Through these connections, we established strong, culturally informed partnerships with local schools, community service providers, and Indigenous leaders, laying the foundation for long-term support in the Kimberley.

Impact and Growth

During our Kimberley engagement, we connected with three new families and anticipate six additional children joining the program. Across Western Australia, we now support over 75 children recovering from cancer, along with more than 20 siblings who benefit from our tailored advocacy and emotional support services.

We have provided over 30 pieces of technology, such as Surface Pros for students and creative materials for younger children, to bridge the digital divide. Our team also works closely with over 50 schools throughout the state to ensure students affected by cancer receive the educational support they need. Currently, 16 families in regional, rural, or remote areas, including the Peel region, receive specialised assistance through our program.

With funding from the Stan Perron Foundation and Telethon 7 Trust, we have expanded our regional outreach, ensuring families in the most remote parts of the state receive equitable access to resources and support. To further strengthen this reach, we have appointed a Senior Educator to lead our Kimberley and Pilbara expansion. Looking ahead to 2025, we aim to extend our services into the Great Southern, Kalgoorlie, Carnarvon, Exmouth, and inland areas such as Newman, aligning with our vision of consistent and accessible support across Western Australia.



Challenges and Adaptations

Supporting children and families in remote regions requires innovative solutions. Life in the Kimberley and other remote areas differs significantly from urban environments, with limited access to services and infrastructure. We are building partnerships with schools, Indigenous leaders, and service providers to address these gaps to ensure culturally informed and impactful support.

Additionally, we are pursuing funding from multiple partners to develop a cutting-edge AI platform that will revolutionise how we deliver tailored education. By enabling customised learning experiences, remote progress monitoring, and predictive insights for students and educators, this technology will empower us to break down barriers of distance and resource limitations. It will serve as a cornerstone of our tailored approach, ensuring every child receives the personalised support they need, regardless of location.

Looking Forward

With sustained funding from the Stan Perron Foundation and Telethon 7 Trust, we are well-positioned to build on our regional success and broaden our impact. Our goal remains clear: to provide every child recovering from cancer—and their families—with the tools, resources, and support they need to thrive, regardless of geography.

We extend our deepest gratitude to our current partners, donors, and community supporters who have made this year's progress possible. However, the journey to ensure no child's education is compromised by location or circumstance is far from over.

2024 has been a year of remarkable growth, resilience, and impact for Back on Track, as we continue to redefine what's possible for children and families navigating life after cancer.

Transforming Education Across Western Australia

Back on Track's Advocacy program has grown rapidly, now serving over 75 participants across the state—from Kununurra and Port Hedland to Albany and Esperance. This year, we've expanded our reach and refined our support to meet the educational and emotional needs of children impacted by cancer and their siblings, wherever they are.

Tailored Educational Support

Our advocates and tutors provide personalised, holistic support that goes beyond academics.

Every child's program is unique, designed to rebuild confidence and re-engage them in learning at their own pace. For instance, creative approaches like arts and crafts have helped us connect with a young girl undergoing brain cancer treatment. We've also developed resources, such as a Visual Processing package, to support students like a Year 2 participant transitioning into Year 3, ensuring their success in the classroom.

Collaborations Strengthening Outcomes

We've expanded the resources available to families through partnerships with local charities. Collaborations with groups like Sam's Spares have equipped students with laptops and adaptive technology, reaching communities as remote as Wyndham.

Armed for Life's camps have provided children with life-changing social experiences, supporting their personal growth beyond education.

Building for the Future

We're laying the foundation for sustainable growth. Enhanced team training ensures the delivery of high-quality support, including virtual assistance via Zoom. With plans to extend support to university-level students, Back on Track continues to evolve, committed to being a lifelong educational ally for children and families navigating life after cancer.

As we reflect on the strides we've made and look toward an even brighter future, I extend my heartfelt gratitude to the children, families, and partners who make our work possible. Together, we are creating lasting change.

FINANCIAL AND OPERATIONAL CONTINUITY

Compliance and Auditing: Registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC),
Back on Track is committed to transparent financial practices. A full annual audit is conducted and facilitated
by an experienced auditor familiar with the Child Cancer Research Foundation (CCRF). The presence of
CCRF's treasurer and CEO on the Board bolsters continuity and operational consistency.

LEADERSHIP AND ACCOUNTABILITY

Decision-Making and Review: The CEO manages high-stakes operational decisions, while major strategic
decisions are made collectively by the Board. Annual reviews of the Board, CEO, and executive positions
ensure that leadership and governance standards are maintained. The Board also approves the annual
budget, as presented by the CEO, aligning financial planning with strategic goals.

• Structure and Responsibilities: The Back on Track Foundation's Board meets every six to eight weeks to oversee strategic direction, set operational policies, and ensure responsible resource management. • Committees: Three key subcommittees—Finance, Risk, and Audit—provide specialised oversight in critical areas, ensuring thorough governance, accountability, and fiscal responsibility.

Meet Our Team





How We Help

The Back on Track Foundation ensures that children recovering from cancer, along with their siblings, receive the educational support they need to thrive during and after treatment. Our tailored approach prevents children from falling behind academically while addressing the emotional and social challenges they face.

OUR SERVICES INCLUDE:

- **Educational Advocacy:** Supporting families by working with schools, educators, and support teams to create individualised learning plans tailored to each child's unique needs.
- Tailored Learning Support: Providing one-on-one tutoring, mentoring, and access to online education for students from Kindergarten to Year 12, with continued support into university or other educational pathways if desired.
- **School Transition Support:** Facilitating a smooth classroom reintegration by working closely with teachers, classmates, and parents to foster understanding and connection.
- Holistic Family Engagement: Extending support to siblings and parents, offering guidance and advocacy to help navigate the education system effectively.
- Regional and Remote Access: Expanding our services to reach families in remote areas of Western Australia, bridging the gap for children who might otherwise lack access to essential resources.



A cornerstone of our program is building trust and relationships with children, many of whom face the lasting impacts of trauma, including PTSD. Our educators understand that engagement with education is not always immediate or straightforward. Instead, success is often reflected in improved attendance, renewed interest in subjects previously dismissed, or even small breakthroughs in confidence and curiosity. This deeply personalised approach ensures every child receives the support they need to rebuild and thrive on their own terms.

By partnering with other childhood cancer charities, educational organisations, and medical teams, Back on Track ensures that every child in our program is supported academically, emotionally, and socially. This holistic approach builds resilience and empowers families to face the future with hope.

A B O U T

Why the Program is needed

The Back on Track Program is a lifeline for children recovering from cancer, their siblings, and their families. Backed by research and insights from families, childhood cancer survivors, and support organisations, the program addresses the unique challenges these families face, spanning educational, psychosocial, cognitive, and systemic barriers.

EDUCATIONAL CHALLENGES

Children undergoing cancer treatment encounter significant educational disruptions due to the physical and emotional toll of their illness. Treatments like chemotherapy, radiotherapy, and surgeries often result in:

- Fatigue and Mobility Issues: Hindering regular school attendance and participation in classroom activities.
- Long-Term Impacts: Hearing loss and fine motor skill impairments affecting learning and engagement.
- Hospitalisation and Absenteeism: This leads to missed academic content, delayed developmental milestones, and reduced social interactions.

The Back on Track Program addresses these challenges by:

- Individualised Education Plans (IEPs): Tailored strategies to meet each child's unique academic, social, and physical needs.
- Teacher Support: Advocates work with educators to enhance understanding of cancer's impacts and ensure classroom accommodations.
- Hospital-School Liaison: Bridging the gap between hospital and home schools, facilitating smooth transitions for children returning to regular environments.

Research shows regular education for children while on cancer treatment results in better quality of life ten years later.



PSYCHOSOCIAL AND COGNITIVE CHALLENGES

The effects of cancer extend far beyond physical health, profoundly impacting children and their families emotionally and socially:

- Cognitive Impairments: Memory and attention issues hinder academic performance.
- Social Isolation and Confidence Loss:
 Absenteeism and limited peer interaction make it challenging to rebuild relationships and self-esteem.
- Psychological Distress: Anxiety, depression, and PTSD complicate reintegration into school and routines.

Families also face significant emotional and psychological strain:

- Parents: Experience stress balancing treatment management, household responsibilities, and emotional challenges, often resembling PTSD.
- Siblings: Struggle with feelings of neglect, loneliness, and resentment due to reduced parental attention and emotional strain.

The Back on Track Program addresses these challenges by:

- Participant Support: Holistic advocacy combining academic, emotional, and social interventions to rebuild confidence and foster resilience.
- School Support: Collaborating with schools to educate staff and provide consistent educational accommodations.
- Sibling Support: Offering targeted resources and emotional support for siblings to maintain their academic and emotional well-being.
- Parental Resources: Empowering parents with tools and guidance to support their child's education and recovery journey.



SYSTEMIC GAPS

Despite the high needs of children recovering from cancer, less than 10% receive additional funding or tailored educational support. Many struggle with:

- Academic Decline: Falling behind in areas such as mathematics, memory, handwriting, and overall confidence.
- Limited Resources in Schools: Insufficient support systems to address their unique needs

The Back on Track Program bridges these systemic gaps by:

- Customised Learning Plans: Providing flexible, individualised tutoring and curriculum support to help children stay on track academically.
- Technological Solutions: Leveraging online platforms and devices to ensure children in remote areas receive the support they need.

By addressing these educational, psychosocial, and systemic challenges, the Back on Track Program ensures children recovering from cancer, their siblings, and their families have the tools and support they need to thrive.



What distinguishes Back on Track from other entities or services in children's health



Education Advocacy Focus

The program specifically advocates for children's education during and after cancer treatment. It recognises the critical role of education in a child's development and works to bridge the gap and support their educational journey.



Tailored Support

Back on Track provides personalised educational support to children based on their individual needs. It offers mentoring, tutoring, and curriculum support, ensuring the assistance is tailored to each child's specific requirements.



Collaboration and Partnerships

The program actively collaborates with schools, online education providers, charities, support groups, and medical teams. This collaborative approach ensures a holistic and coordinated support system for the children, involving various stakeholders in their education and well-being.



Technological Solutions

Back on Track leverages technology and online education platforms to reach children in remote and regional areas. This enables them to receive educational support regardless of their geographical location, addressing the unique challenges faced by Indigenous children and those in remote areas of Western Australia.

These unique characteristics make the Back on Track program essential in addressing the educational needs of children who have survived cancer.

By focusing on education advocacy, providing tailored support, collaborating with stakeholders, and utilising technology, the program offers a comprehensive and distinct approach to supporting these children's health and educational outcomes.





Back on Track has made significant strides in expanding its reach throughout Western Australia, ensuring that more children recovering from cancer and their families have access to critical educational support. In 2024, we successfully extended our services to the West and East Kimberley regions, building on our foundation in the Perth Metropolitan area, Peel, South West, Great Southern, Pilbara, and Wheatbelt. This expansion significantly reduced the disparity in access to educational advocacy for children in remote and regional areas.

GROWTH ACHIEVED IN 2024

- West and East Kimberley: Established connections with community leaders, schools, and healthcare providers to deliver tailored educational support. This included direct engagement with local families and onboarding new students into the program.
- Pilbara Region: Strengthened our presence with additional resources, ensuring families in this region receive ongoing support.
- Regional Collaboration: Expanded partnerships with local organisations, enabling us to tailor support for Indigenous and rural communities.

GOALS FOR 2025

To achieve our vision of reaching every child in WA by the end of 2025, we are focused on expanding to the following key regions:

- Gascoyne: Establishing services in this sparsely populated region to support families facing significant geographical challenges.
- Midwest: Enhancing educational accessibility through hybrid in-person and online models tailored to the unique needs of this region.
- Goldfields-Esperance: Partnering with local schools and organisations to overcome barriers to education for children in remote mining and farming communities.

PATH TO FULL COVERAGE

Our approach includes:

- Deploying additional educators and program coordinators dedicated to these regions.
- Leveraging AI technology to bridge gaps in service delivery, ensuring even the most remote families can access support.
- Engaging with local stakeholders to develop culturally appropriate and community-specific solutions.
- Strengthening partnerships with regional schools, health networks, and corporate sponsors to fund and sustain these initiatives.

By addressing social, emotional, and academic needs, we empowered students to rebuild confidence, reengage with education, and thrive in their communities.

Through a compassionate, personalised approach led by a dedicated team of education professionals, we set a new benchmark for quality educational support during and after cancer treatment.

DID YOU KNOW?

CURRENT TREATMENTS CAUSE SEVERE AND OFTEN LIFELONG SIDE EFFECTS, INCLUDING PROBLEMS WITH:

- Emotions, reproduction, growth, development, hormones, learning, memory, heart, lung, dental, digestive system, hearing, vision, sexual development, and sexual function.
- Most strikingly, they can cause secondary cancers.
- Childhood cancer survivors report higher rates of pain, fatigue, and sleep difficulties compared with siblings and peers, all of which are associated with poorer quality of life.
- Symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder are well-documented for parents whose children have completed cancer treatment.

Improved attendance reflects students' growing trust and emotional stability. For many, simply showing up consistently is a powerful step toward reengaging with education.

Long Term Impacts

Academic Progress






Empathy at Scale

+ How we create impact

Back on Track creates impact through several key strategies and initiatives:



Scholarships and Enriching Experiences

As part of our commitment to tailored and impactful support, the Back on Track Foundation funds scholarships for transformative educational opportunities. Recent examples include a student attending a STEM week in Canberra and another participating in a prestigious space camp. Tailored experiences, such as visits to AQWA, spark curiosity and foster learning in enriching settings. Ensuring these opportunities are accessible to all children, regardless of location, is critical to fostering life-changing outcomes.



Adaptive Learning Strategies

Non-traditional tools, such as sensory resources and activity boxes, engage children who may struggle with conventional academics. These strategies meet students where they are, helping them reconnect with learning.



Family-Centred Support

We empower families and siblings with resources to navigate educational challenges, recognising their integral role in a child's success.



Integrated Partnerships

Expanded Regional Support

We now support 16 families in regional and remote areas, addressing the unique challenges of distance and resource availability. Our team works closely with regional coordinators and principals to ensure these families receive the tailored support they need.



Technological Empowerment

Over 30 pieces of technology, including adapted devices, have been distributed to support students' educational access. These tools ensure children can engage with online learning, regardless of geographical location or physical limitations.

Through these comprehensive efforts, Back on Track helps children bridge the educational gap caused by their illness and treatment. It empowers them to overcome psychological and emotional hurdles, enabling them to reclaim their childhoods and pursue their aspirations with confidence and resilience.





IS YOUR CHILD CURRENTLY IN TREATMENT? Total Respondents: 40




HAS YOUR CHILD'S TREATMENT IMPACTED THEIR EDUCATION?














HAVE YOUR CHILD'S GRADES IMPROVED SINCE BEING ENROLLED IN THE BACK ON TRACK PROGRAM?






WHAT IS YOUR PREFERRED METHOD OF RECEIVING EDUCATIONAL SUPPORT?



CASE STUDY #1 - SHAY



OVERVIEW

Shay, a bright and determined 6-year-old, was diagnosed with Wilms' Tumour in June 2024. This diagnosis and the subsequent intensive treatment necessitated a complete family relocation from Esperance to Perth.

Shay, his parents Melanie and Steve, his 8-month-old sister Brigetta, and his 8-year-old brother Caolan initially stayed at Ronald McDonald House. However, the living arrangements proved challenging for the family of five, particularly with a young baby. To better accommodate Shay's health needs and provide a more stable environment, the family moved to Cambridge House, which offered greater space and essential amenities like a kitchen.



During this time, Shay's mother Melanie, a teacher herself, sought additional academic support to ensure Shay wouldn't fall behind in his education while undergoing treatment. The Back on Track program became an integral part of Shay's routine, providing creative and individualised support that met his academic, emotional, and physical needs during this critical period.

CHALLENGES

Shay faced several significant challenges as he navigated his illness and education:

- Resistance to Traditional Learning: Shay openly expressed his reluctance to engage in conventional learning, particularly writing tasks. He frequently stated, "I don't want to learn to write," reflecting both physical and mental fatigue from his treatment.
- Emotional and Psychological Strain: Living away from home and enduring the rigours of treatment placed considerable emotional strain on Shay, which in turn affected his focus and motivation.
- Physical Limitations: His illness left him frail, with reduced stamina and fine motor skills, further complicating tasks like writing.
- Educational Disruption: Since beginning treatment, Shay has not been able to attend in-person classes, and online learning options were insufficient to meet his needs or keep him engaged.
- Family Challenges: Balancing the care of a sick child with the needs of two other children was overwhelming for Melanie and Steve, particularly given the unique demands of treatment and relocation.

EDUCATION GOALS

The Back on Track program tailored its goals to meet Shay's unique needs, balancing academic progress with his emotional well-being:

- Maintain Academic Progress: Focus on developing foundational literacy and numeracy skills to mitigate learning loss caused by treatment-related school absences.
- 2. Build Engagement: Use creative, playbased approaches to rekindle Shay's interest in learning.
- 3. Develop Fine Motor Skills: Introduce sensory-rich, hands-on activities to strengthen his fine motor skills while reducing resistance to writing tasks.
- 4. Enhance Emotional Resilience: Provide a nurturing environment to help Shay manage the psychological and emotional challenges of his illness.

OBSERVATIONS & PROGRESS

- Increased Engagement: Shay now approaches activities with curiosity and enthusiasm. He proudly showcases his completed work, often asking for photos to be taken and showing them to his mother with a big smile.
- Improved Writing Confidence: Through interactive and non-traditional methods, Shay has started forming and copying words, even writing some independently – a milestone he once resisted.
- Emotional Growth: Shay's confidence and resilience have flourished. He is proud of his achievements and enjoys seeing his stories in print, laughing and smiling at his progress.
- Fine Motor Development: Sensory activities have discreetly strengthened Shay's hand and finger muscles, preparing him for more advanced writing and drawing tasks.

SUPPORT STRATEGIES

The program took an innovative and holistic approach to supporting Shay's learning and emotional needs:

- Weekly One-on-One Sessions: Shay attends sessions at the Back on Track office with GenGen, where learning is disguised as fun and interactive play. These sessions focus on sensory and incidental learning methods.
- 2. Custom Activity Boxes: Tailored to Shay's needs, each box includes hands-on activities for literacy and numeracy. For example, magnetic letters, sand, playdoh, bean bags, and dot painting are used to develop fine motor skills and make learning enjoyable.
- Storytelling and Creativity: By encouraging Shay
 to record and create his own stories, the program
 has fostered his creativity and sparked a newfound
 interest in literacy.
- 4. Humour and Play: Nonsense word games, often resulting in hilarious pronunciations by staff, tap into Shay's sense of humour, creating positive associations with learning.
- 5. Sibling Support: Shay's older brother, Caolan, receives weekly in-class advocacy from Stewie, easing the family's overall caregiving burden and ensuring both boys remain on track educationally.





FAMILY IMPACT

- Support for Siblings: The program's advocacy for Caolan ensures his educational needs are met, allowing Melanie and Steve to focus on Shay and their youngest child, Brigetta.
- Parental Reassurance: Melanie, who holds high academic expectations for Shay, has expressed her satisfaction with the program's approach. She appreciates the balance between nurturing Shay's emotional wellbeing and fostering achievable academic progress.
- Family Stability: The
 comprehensive support provided
 by Back on Track has alleviated
 much of the family's stress,
 creating a more positive and stable
 environment during an incredibly
 challenging time.

MILESTONE ACHIEVEMENTS

- By his third session, Shay actively chose a topic of interest and used magnetic letters to form words. This marked a significant turning point in his willingness to engage with literacy.
- Shay has begun writing words independently and proudly shares his work, reflecting his growing confidence and motivation.

IMPACT AND RESULTS

- Academic Progress: Despite missing traditional schooling, Shay has made strides in literacy and numeracy. His willingness to engage with activities has increased, and he is developing foundational skills in an environment tailored to his needs.
- Emotional Well-Being: The nurturing and playful approach has lifted Shay's spirits, fostering resilience and a renewed enthusiasm for learning.
- Parental Satisfaction: Melanie has observed significant improvements in Shay's mental health and academic abilities, expressing deep gratitude for the program's support.

SUMMARY

Shay Hart's journey highlights the profound impact of personalised, creative educational support during times of medical and emotional crisis. Through its tailored approach, the Back on Track program has helped Shay rediscover his love of learning, build confidence, and maintain a sense of normalcy despite the challenges of his treatment.

For Melanie and Steve, the program has provided muchneeded peace of mind, ensuring their children's educational needs are met while they navigate this difficult chapter in their lives. Shay's story underscores the importance of holistic support in addressing both academic and emotional needs, demonstrating how innovative solutions can transform lives.

The Back on Track program continues to support Shay's development, fostering resilience and optimism as he moves forward with a strong foundation for future success.



CASE STUDY #2 - SIBLINGS: WESLEY AND KIMMI



The case of Wesley and Kimmi showcases the profound impact of our educational advocacy program, providing personalised support to both children with a history of cancer and their siblings. Wesley's journey, marked by the challenges of cancer and its treatment, and Kimmi's experience as an older sibling, are testaments to the program's adaptability in meeting both academic and emotional needs. Through our tailored support, we have witnessed significant growth in both children's educational engagement and personal development, enhancing their school experience and fostering resilience within the family.

WESLEY'S JOURNEY (YEAR 6, 2024)



Wesley's story begins with a heartbreaking diagnosis at the age of 20 months. After a fall at the local school playground, an unexpected discovery was made: a large tumour wrapped around his kidney. This led to an emergency surgery to remove both his kidney and the tumour. The process was harrowing, with a six-hour surgery

followed by numerous attempts to insert needles for pain relief, leaving little Wesley traumatised by the experience.

Post-surgery, chemotherapy followed, introducing more challenges. Despite the medical team's efforts, the chemotherapy was emotionally and physically taxing for a child so young. Wesley was kept isolated from other children during this period due to his compromised immune system, which severely impacted his social development during those critical early years.

This set the stage for struggles in school, compounded by undiagnosed ADHD, affecting his ability to understand social cues and engage in conversations. His mother reflects, "I believe it's because he was separated from other kids during those

developmental years."

As he grew older, Wesley faced challenges with socialisation and academics, but his resilience shone through. Over the years, he has grown into a bright, enthusiastic student, and despite the obstacles, his progress has been remarkable. Now, as he completes Year 6, he is thriving academically, showing





an increasing love for learning, particularly in English.
His teacher, Brooke, shares, "Wesley is a delightful young man in my Year Six classroom. He is a bright and engaged student who is always keen to participate."
Wesley's recent achievements are testament to his hard work and the dedicated support he receives.

With Caroline, his advocate, offering weekly assistance in his genre writing lessons, Wesley has shown impressive growth. His teacher has noted that the support from Caroline has greatly benefited his writing skills, helping him to plan, draft, and improve his work. "Wesley himself commented on several occasions about how his writing was improving," Brooke adds, emphasising the pride he takes in his progress.

The advocacy support has not only improved his academic performance but has also greatly boosted his confidence. With Caroline's encouragement, Wesley has become more confident in taking risks with his writing and seeking help when needed, leading to a higher quality of work and self-belief.

Wesley's mother proudly recounts his growth, "For a boy who had experienced so much trauma and had ADHD, to hear him say, 'Mum, I want to achieve more A's at school,' was absolutely the best thing I could hear!" This is a testament to the impact of both the program and Wesley's inner strength.



KIMMI'S SUPPORT (YEAR 8, 2024)

Kimmi, Wesley's older sister, has also greatly benefited from the support provided by Caroline.

As a Year 8 student, Kimmi faces her own academic pressures, compounded by the emotional challenges of having a brother who has battled cancer. The stress of balancing schoolwork and her brother's health struggles has not been easy, but Caroline's after-school support has offered her much-needed stability.

Kimmi's mother shares, "Caroline also helps Kimmi revise for her tests and spends time helping her with handling stress associated with her assessments. So, we are all very happy." The emotional support and academic guidance Kimmi receives are crucial in ensuring she feels seen and valued, as the emotional toll of supporting her brother while managing her own schooling can be overwhelming.



HIGHLIGHTING SIBLING SUPPORT

The support for both Wesley and Kimmi underscores the holistic approach of the program, which addresses not only the academic needs of the child with cancer but also the emotional and educational needs of their siblings. By offering tailored academic support during key lessons and providing emotional guidance, Caroline has ensured that both children thrive in a school environment that is nurturing, compassionate, and responsive to their unique needs.

The active collaboration between the educational advocate, the school, and the family highlights the importance of a well-rounded support system. The positive relationships formed between Caroline and the children, their teachers, and their family create a strong foundation for growth.

CASE STUDY #3 - SONIA



OUR INTRODUCTION TO BACK ON TRACK...

We first heard of Back on Track through the PCH 1A Families Support Group Facebook Page, when Sonia had just started high school in 2023. During our move from Collie to Bencubbin later that year, whilst continuing to try and assist Sonia with her education, homework and other therapies, I very quickly recognised that extra help (above my skill level) was required!

I was rather surprised and pleased when researching Back on Track, to find that they were able to assist Sonia via Zoom/Teams, were happy to liaise with the school, and could also help her siblings if required! This was great to hear, considering Kaden (one of Sonia's younger brothers) continues to struggle with certain things after an extremely disjointed Year 1, whilst living at Ronald McDonald House for Sonia's year of treatment in 2019.

It didn't take long, before Sonia started regular tutoring via Zoom with Back on Track. This ensured Sonia received the extra support and assistance she required and allowed me to focus a bit more on Sonia's younger siblings. Effectively improving things for everyone. Going forward into 2025, we're looking forward to continuing work with Back on Track to assist Sonia with both immediate requirements as well as building methods/strategies to assist her with her future studies/endeavours, and also Kaden as he transitions into high school.

Sonia, a Year 8 student, faced significant challenges after being diagnosed with a Medulloblastoma brain tumour in 2019. Post-surgery, Sonia developed Posterior Fossa Syndrome and now lives with an Acquired Brain Injury (ABI). These conditions have affected her physical, cognitive, and social capabilities, including a weaker right side, slower cognitive processing speed, and increased mental and physical fatigue. Despite these challenges, Sonia is a resilient, hardworking student who is determined to succeed in her educational journey.



Sonia's ABI presents unique challenges in her daily learning. Her slower processing speed, timidity, and physical limitations have made tasks such as note-taking, understanding new concepts, and retaining information more difficult. Sonia has received extensive therapy support, including Occupational Therapy (OT), Speech Therapy, and Physiotherapy through the NDIS. However, the loss of local therapy services in Term 2 – 3 in 2023 added to the family's concerns.

Her parents have worked tirelessly to bridge gaps in her education and support her social and emotional needs.

ACTION

To address these challenges, the Back on Track program implemented a tailored plan:

- **1. Weekly Tutoring:** Providing Sonia with consistent, targeted support in her core subjects.
- 2. Teacher Collaboration: Advocating for Sonia's needs by maintaining open communication with her teachers to ensure she receives scaffolding and extra time for tasks and assessments.
- **3. At-Home Support:** Encouraging Sonia to complete unfinished work at home, with her teachers providing copies of classroom notes to aid in her understanding.
- 4. Skill Development: Introducing scaffolding techniques and breaking tasks into manageable steps to build Sonia's confidence and autonomy in completing assignments.

CHALLENGES

- Cognitive processing speed makes it hard to keep up with the pace of classroom activities.
- Difficulty completing physical writing tasks such as notes and worksheets within allocated time.
- Retaining and understanding new concepts without significant repetition and support.
- Social vulnerability due to her timidity and slower responses, which could lead to her being taken advantage of by peers.
- Limited access to consistent, affordable tutoring and therapy services in regional Western Australia, with potential further reductions if the family relocates (Father is a police officer).

SOLUTION


Recognising Sonia's need for consistent educational support, Back On Track introduced online tutoring sessions tailored to her pace and learning needs.

This allowed her to engage in structured, supportive learning without the need to travel long distances for in-person services. The online format also provided flexibility for her family, reducing stress and enabling her mother to focus on supporting Sonia's siblings.

BENEFITS

- Educational Progress: Sonia is managing to keep up with her peers in class and feels more confident in her ability to complete tasks.
- Family Support: The tutoring sessions have allowed Sonia's mother to spend more time supporting her other children, alleviating family pressures.
- Skill Confidence: Sonia is developing greater confidence in her communication skills and her ability to engage with schoolwork independently.

Reaching Every Child in WA

By the end of 2025, our expanded services will reach even the most geographically isolated communities across WA. We will achieve this through:

- Deploying additional resources and educators to underserved regions.
- Strengthening partnerships with local schools, healthcare providers, and community organisations.
- Incorporating technology, such as hybrid inperson and online support, to bridge the gap for remote families.

This comprehensive approach ensures no child is left behind, regardless of location, and reaffirms our commitment to educational inclusivity for all young cancer survivors and their siblings.

At the heart of our 2025 plans is developing a proprietary Al platform to revolutionise how we deliver our programs. This technology will:
